"You are the light of the world."

IN JOHN 8:12 JESUS SAYS, "I am the light of the world." When speaking to the crowd during the Sermon on the Mount he also says "You are the light of the world." (Mt. 5:14) What might it mean to be the light of the world? How can we tell when we have achieved "lu-

minescence"?

In his book The Third Jesus, Dr. Chopra notes that Jesus sets a standard that often seems beyond human reach. Most of us can't imagine what it might be like to take no thought for tomorrow or to be the light for the world that we see on the nightly news. Most of us are just focused on getting through February and March, and perhaps hoping that spring will come early this year. In short we are so caught up in our lives, our difficulties and our interests that there is little room for the "new life" that the Jesus of the scriptures speaks of. And yet Jesus tells us that the only way to reach what he calls the Father (or Papa) is the way he is showing us. Does that mean that we will all be stuck in an earthly limbo for eternity? I don't believe so, and I don't think Jesus believed that either.

I invite you to contemplate what it might mean to be what he called "the light of the world." A light is something that shines and shares its radiance with everything around it. In Jesus' time there were two kinds of lights. There were small oil lamps that people used for lighting their homes. While these were not par-

ticularly bright they would make a huge difference in a dark house with few windows. There was also fire light, but this was much less common. Wood was scarce and most cooking was done with brush or dung for fuel. The people of Jesus' time could not even imagine the brilliance of the lights that we take for granted today.

The Bible offers one additional description of light which we might call radiance. Moses speaks of it when he describes a bush that seemed to be on fire, yet wasn't consumed by the fire. Later Moses is described as having to cover his face after an encounter with God because he was radiantly aglow. The apostle Paul experiences inner light that temporarily blinds and also transforms him. During the Pentecost following Jesus' resurrection, his disciples are seen to have flames (light?) above their heads. The Gospel of Matthew also describes Peter, James and John seeing Jesus "shining like the sun, his clothing dazzling white." What do these references mean? Were these metaphors or physical experiences?

Metaphysically speaking light represents inspired spiritual understanding, an inner illumination of the mind. While our human eyes can only see the very narrow range of light that science calls "visible light," there is something in us that is able to sense inner illumination. Painters and illustrators often depicted this as halos or auras surrounding people. Some people question whether halos or spiritual light is actually seen or if this is simply a trick of the eye. While I don't usually see halos or auras, and in have little interest in doing so, I have been very surprised

on a several occasions when I experienced glowing light surrounding people. I once saw light around a woman who was giving a lecture at a professional conference. She was passionately describing her therapy work with groups of women who had experienced abuse. As she talked about her work and the healing that her clients were experiencing, she liter-

ally began to radiate a strong golden light. No one around me seemed to notice. A spiritual teacher I met told me about speaking to a group of people when the entire audience vanished from his sight and was replaced by one beautiful radiant light. How separate are we in reality?

If we hear that a person "lights up the room" when they enter, we usually don't take this in a literal sense. It usually means that something in that person's presence is sensed by the others in the room. Sometimes this seems to shift the energy of the room in a positive, peaceful or hopeful way. Could this be an

experience of inner light being sensed but unseen? I would imagine that most people's experience of Jesus was something like this, sensing rather than seeing his light. Most of the time we depend on our human eyes; not yet having developed what Jesus speaks of when he refers to "those who have eyes to see and ears to hear." But he implies that we do have the capacity to develop these, to be able to see and hear beyond the limits of our human organs. And he tells us that we are like him, we are lights unto the world.

We are encouraged not to hide our light but to share it and to let it shine. Could making the choice to share a smile or a positive attitude be a first step in learning to let your inner light shine? Could choosing to love the people you live or work around not only light up your mind but theirs as well? Could cheerfully lending a hand change someone's life, maybe even yours? While these may not seem like spiritual practices, each is actually a very powerful practice for sharing light and also for learning to sense it.

The light of the world is not something unique to

Jesus. It's not unique to any person. It lives in each of us. Sometimes we cover it over or just ignore it, distracting ourselves. We tell ourselves that other things are more important, or perhaps more interesting. We plan to learn about being the light of the world later, once other things settle down. What we don't understand is that those other things never settle down, at least not for long, and so the light in us goes unseen and unshared. Failing to share your light and failing to learn to see the light in others can make for a long dark cold winter. Why wait for something outside of you to

brighten up your life? You are the light of the world. You can discover this by sharing your light in simple ways. As you let your light shine, it will teach you to sense and perhaps even see, the inner radiance in those around you.




