Tombs of Our Own Making

AFTER THE SABBATH, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. Suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, his clothing white as snow. The guards at the tomb shook in fear of him and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said." (Matthew 28:1-5)

A tomb is a chamber sealed off and separated from the rest of the world. Its purpose is to keep what lies inside, that which is dead, from being disturbed. But some tombs are inhabited by the living, not by the dead. Many of us live in tombs of our own making. These are in effect tiny shrines dedicated to our perceptions of how things are, secured to keep our beliefs safe from the light of day and undisturbed by outside thoughts. We construct these tombs with bits of though we collect over lifetimes, thoughts borrowed from others, thoughts we make up for ourselves. Some of these thoughts may have been vital and alive but once we cement them into the walls of our tiny separate "kingdom" they quickly lose whatever life they once had. We often seal our tombs with stones marked "and that is just the way it is". We place guards by our tombs to make sure that not one of these stones is disturbed, not even by God.

If we are religious people then some parts of our tomb may be built of religious or spiritual

may be built of religious or spiritual thoughts. Thoughts of what must be done or what must never be done in order to please the gods of our imagination. Some build tombs of with thoughts failure and unworthiness, beliefs that past failures now make them unworthy of love or suc-


cess. Most tombs contain sad bits of belief about of loss, death and grief; and of how and when it is acceptable or unacceptable to die and pass on. And each tomb is sealed with a final stone, a strong belief designed to guard the door and keep the tomb safe. The stone might be marked with the idea that because

painful and difficult things happened to me I am destined to always suffer and be alone. Another tomb might be sealed with the belief that because I once caused injury, pain or loss I am unworthy of experiencing acceptance or community. Sometimes it's just an old familiar stone marked, nobody from my family or town ever gets to be very happy for very long... "and that is just the way it is." These stones are designed to protect all the other bits of belief that make up the structure of this tomb we have built around our self.

Easter (Passover) was the time Jesus chose to challenge our collective misbelief of about life and death. Each of the tombs we have become trapped in contains many bits of belief about what it means to be born, to live, and to die. These misbeliefs about death may come from religious traditions. They may come from family or friends or "experts". Each gets set into a special place in our little tomb where we can admire it and remain loyal to its dictates. Often these "final beliefs" are used to seal ourselves into our chamber. No one in their right mind would dare challenge our painful stories about grieving and dying, no one except perhaps Jesus.



But instead of challenging the beliefs of others Jesus chose to teach that these misbeliefs about death were hollow and empty by demonstrating that they had no power over him. He did that by publically rolling away the stone that said "other people",

Tombs of Our Own Making —

Romans or Jews, had the power to harm or kill him. One of our most strongly protected beliefs is that "other people" are somehow ultimately responsible for what happens to us; our births, our lives, our deaths. We may affirm that we are co-creators of our life-experience. We may pardon others by telling ourselves that they didn't know better or couldn't help themselves. But notice how much of this thought system is still built on top of the idea that, "it's mostly because of them". I believe that when Jesus said, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do" he was experiencing a revelation that, regardless of what they may have appeared to do to him, or even what they thought they were doing to him, they were in fact doing nothing. If this were not true they would have remained guilty and the forgiveness that he offered would have been hollow and unjustified.

Ultimately it is the "angel of the Lord" - an inner revelation from God to us - that rolls away the stones we have used to seal our tiny tomb and lets in the light of clear understanding that shows us the kind and healing truth about all the things we have tried to keep in darkness. Jesus demonstrated, in a very public way, that no person, event or thought system could entomb him. His Easter message was that what God has created whole and alive and free, remains so for all time. We can help prepare for this experience in our own lives by refusing to add any more stones of negative or limiting belief to the tombs or walls we have built. We can stop rolling up fiercely marked stones in front of our doorways, stones that proclaim damaged, defective or dead... keep away. And we can trust that regardless of what others may seem to have done to us or tried to do to us, the clear light of God can help us see both them and ourselves as whole, innocent and fully forgiven. As we practice trusting the Light of God rather than the safety of our own tomb, our "shrine to suffering"; we will gently awaken to the light of day and find that "the angel of the Lord" has rolled away the last dark stone that once kept us trapped in a tiny tomb of our own making.

May we bravely release even our most dearly held allegiances to sadness and death into the hands of our Creator; knowing that by the hand of Love, we are resurrected into wholeness and peace. Amen

I now refer to myself as an *overcomer*—not a survivor, an overcomer.

If we believe we are truly one with the spirit of God, we must believe that Spirit within us is ready always to be drawn into active service. However great the undertaking, you will be successful if you call forth the dynamic powers that are yours to command and make yourself an open channel for the expression of good.

When you keep your focus on the Christ Light and follow a divine path, all your mental, physical and spiritual efforts yield only good to you and to the world. It is important to acknowledge and cooperate with the wise, all-knowing mind of God in all you think, say and do.

It is up to us to stop placing limitations upon ourselves, to stop measuring ourselves by past abilities or experiences or by our family ancestors. Step out on the illumined path of Truth and prove what you are—what you can do and be—through Christ Consciousness.

Spotlight on Service

Once in a great while, someone will urge us to become involved in an activity that uses talents of ours that we may not have been aware of. Sometimes we're the last to know what we are capable of. For Leslie, her acceptance of an invitation to run for the Board of Trustees has given her the opportunity to serve and to find more of what God has in store for her on her spiritual jouney.

"I feel as though Unity Church has been drawing me in or that I had been walking toward it for years. I have always had a yearning to grow spiritually and had been searching for the right fit for a long time. I knew that ultimately spiritual growth is personal work, and I also knew that having great support helps, which leads me to how I came to Unity.

"Several years ago while spending a Saturday afternoon at Barnes and Noble, my husband, Joe, and I each decided to treat ourselves to a new spiritual book. While sitting at a table with a stack of books between us to decide which books spoke to us the most, Jim and Kay Fuller came by. Jim introduced himself as the Pastor of Unity Church. He noticed our books and I commented on the books in his arms that I had already read. Before you know it, Jim and Kay had invited us to church the next day, which happened to be the Church in the Park service. We played it safe and committed to attending the following Sunday...ease into it. We have been attending Unity ever since. That meeting was a great gift and I am sure it was not by chance.

"I was raised in a United Methodist Church – my mother's church - and we occasionally went to my father's church – a Catholic church - in the summer because the services fit into our beach time which was important at the time. My Dad told us he was ex-communicated (his words) from the Catholic Church for marrying outside of his faith despite being born and raised in the same church as his parents. He was very supportive of the CYO programs there, but never again took communion which I think became his choice as the years went on.

"For me, it did not feel right. I could not believe that God was not all inclusive and that anyone would be left behind. I also knew that God, the Great Mystery, would honor the many ways to the One. Regardless, church services to

me had felt like an obligation, and for the most part I seldom left feeling nurtured, embraced, or provided with thought provoking ideas. I knew there was more, knew it included everyone, and I knew in my heart that I was very much a part of the process as a co-creator.

"When I came to Unity I felt like I had come home. It was welcoming, all inclusive, loving, and I cannot say enough about the Sunday messages and music. That fall I began attending classes, workshops, and other events; I could not get enough. This community was giving so much to me that soon it was time for me

to start giving back by getting involved in service.

"I feel as though my service began by attending the Wednesday classes at Unity. The service was initially for myself, because it spiritually supported and encouraged my growth. This journey to know God is a personal one, but I knew I would take all the help I could get, which is just what Unity offers. Classes have helped me become more focused on the stillness that lies within me, and getting in touch with that Divine nature that lies in each and every one of us. It seemed that

everyone who attended the classes was giving service by supporting everyone's growth process, individual as it may be. I highly recommend attending a Unity class if you are thinking of taking a step to become more involved. Start with a class, learn to grow and become more acquainted with everyone else. You will then feel a stirring in you to start giving back.

"Shortly thereafter I began working in the bookstore. It was within my comfort zone. I love books and reading, so it seemed natural for me. I like a quote that I heard earlier this week that talked about "Being carried like a feather on the breath of God." Maybe that is what I'm allowing to happen. By helping in the bookstore I got to know more people and do what I enjoyed. From there I started to alternate as an Usher.

"Being asked to serve on the Board of Trustees at Unity came as a real surprise to me! DianeTuetschman did a great job of convincing me that it would be a wonderful experience for me. She was right; I decided to go for it and trust that it was all part of the process. I have just allowed myself to be carried along in this journey. What a wonderful experience and gift it has been. You can't imagine how fulfilling it is to work on the Board with such a supportive, gifted, and empowering group of people.

"So, if you are thinking of volunteering your time and talents to Unity, I highly recommend that you do so; it is the gift that keeps on giving.
