After Easter

EASTER WAS THE ORIGINAL Christian holiday. Long before the stories and traditions around Christmas were formulated and worked into the church calendar Easter stood alone as the holy day of the Christian movement. Followers of "the Way", as the early Jesus movement was known, would gather to remember the stories of his final trip to Jerusalem, his martyrdom and his resurrection. One would presume that these early gatherings were small and simple. They probably stayed small for many decades as the religious and political situation in Judea and Jerusalem deteriorated.

Later as the gospels of Mark, Matthew, Luke and John were being compiled in the late first and early second century an idea emerged that shaped the future of Christianity. The idea was this, Jesus wasn't just a prophet and martyr; he was an atoning sacrifice to God. Never mind that according to the Jewish Torah only the heathen nations would practice abominations like human sacrifice. Never mind that the valley outside Jerusalem which Jesus calls Gahanna (sometimes translated as Hell) was considered unfit for habitation because it had been a place where former nations had practiced human sacrifice. Putting facts and history aside, as we often do, the followers of Jesus who compiled our gospels and filled them with commentary decided that Jesus must have been an atoning sacrifice, just like the sheep and animals that were ritually slaughtered at the Jerusalem Temple.

It is important to remember that the messiah the Jewish people of Jesus' time were looking for was a warrior-priest, someone to drive the Romans from the land and reestablish the Hebrew nation. Some scholars speculate that Judas' reason for turning Jesus in was not for money as the gospels state but to force his hand in confronting the Romans. Jesus was clearly a God connected man, a man with spiritual power. Wouldn't God come to his rescue? Perhaps Jesus would use his God-connection to call together the many revolutionary groups who were already active in Judea at the time? Within a few decades after Jesus some of these revolutionary groups did attempt to overthrow the Romans which led to the demise of the Temple in Jerusalem. When we read our gospels it is important to remember that this was the social and political situation taking place just before our gospels were complied.

So Jesus was not a warrior-priest, nor was he like the judges or kings of the Old Testament. But clearly Jesus was more than just another martyred prophet. And while some people saw and experienced him after the resurrection, he was no longer readily present as he had been before Easter. What could all this mean? The theology of "God's atoning sacrifice" was the meaning that the compliers of our gospels came up with. Since other competing gospels were later destroyed we don't know if there were alternative opinions. Early Christian theologians went on to expand the sacrifice idea to include the idea of redemptive suffering. A century or so later this was merged with another concept, that of original sin. Finally Christianity had created a "solid reason" for a special human sacrifice, a way to justify what to Jesus would have seemed unjustifiable.

The notions (and they are simply notions) of inherent or inherited sin and the virtue of atoning suffering and sacrifice has shaped western culture ever since this unholy alliance of ideas took place. It is woven not just into our religious holy-days but also into our basic understanding of the human condition. We perceive humanity as broken or fallen people, lost souls. We imagine that suffering and dying are our just due for our individual and collective mistakes. We are reminded that Jesus suffered for us (Is that really true?) and so why shouldn't we expect to suffer along as well, accepting our collective fate? Brokenness, guilt, sin, suffering, suffering and sacrifice are very present

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in all aspects of western culture; legal, social, moral, religious.

Since we now understand that the beliefs and expectation we hold in our creative and powerful minds must show up in our lives in one way or another, is it any wonder that we experience ourselves living in a world filled with sinful, suffering, unworthy creatures? Is it any wonder that we cower in fear of some "final judgment" which will naturally result in yet more suffering and sacrifice? Can you see the emerging pattern here? Was this really the "good news" that Jesus came to share?

Easter has come and gone. The Jesus of the Easter story has walked quietly through what the worshipers of suffering saw as injustice, death and disgrace. But was that how Jesus saw it or experienced it? Today you and I have the opportunity to walk quietly through something much less dramatic yet equally frightening to us; the dense cloud of man-made ideas, of theologies of sin and suffering and sacrifice. The good news is that only truth is true, no matter what cultures or religions may teach, no matter what appearances may seem to show. Only love is real, no matter how loudly we may individually or collectively proclaim otherwise. We are not inherently broken or evil; none of us. We are not capable of damaging or destroying God or God's creation, not any part of it.

The only loss you and I will ever face is the loss of our stories, our precious rituals of suffering and sadness. The real Jesus of the gospels is still with us as inspiration, imagination and support to guide us through the Easter process we must complete; the releasing, letting go and forgiving all that is not true, not of God. When we have walked quietly through our own letting go of the un-true, when we have forgiven and released our un-Godly thoughts, what will remain for us to experience but God and God's whole, innocent and perfect creation?

May we accept Jesus' Easter invitation to release all unholy ideas of sin, suffering and sacrifice and welcome the truth of our holiness and perfection. May our minds and lives be healed this day. Amen.

Meeting Jesus Again for the First Time By, Marcus J. Borg

In Meeting Jesus Again for the First Time, Marcus Borg addresses the yearnings of those who want a fully contemporary faith that welcomes rather than oppresses our critical intelligence and openness to the best of historical scholarship. Borg looks at the major findings of modern Jesus scholarship from the perspective of faith, bringing alive the many levels of Jesus' character: spirit person, teacher of alternative wisdom, social prophet, and movement founder. He also reexamines the major stories of the Old Testament vital to an authentic understanding of Jesus, showing how an enriched understanding of these stories can uncover new truths and new pathways to faith. Borg notes, "Ultimately,



Jesus is not simply a figure of the past, but a figure of the present. Meeting that Jesus—the living one who comes to us even now—will be like meeting Jesus again for the first time."

Rev Jim will lead a discussion on the book Sunday May $26^{\rm th}$ at noon.

Who Is Jesus Christ And What's He To Me?

I had been seeking an answer to this vexing question for years, and the harder I tried the more the answer eluded me. I was just too thick to "get it" while others seemed to understand and appeared to be very comfortable in their worship of, and in their relationship to Jesus. I remember during a sermon many years ago, a very kindly pastor said that we should see Jesus in the homeless street person, the drunk, and the lessfortunate of all stripes, and then act toward them as we would toward Jesus. That seemed a nice thing to do and a terribly sinful act if I didn't step up. I had come to see Jesus as the only son of God and as Godmade-man, and also as someone to emulate, which seemed impossible for me, since I was quite flawed and sinful and no matter how hard I tried, I would fail miserably and feel hopelessly deficient. .

Born into a traditional religion, I experienced a certain adolescent security and emotional nurturing there, yet my life was so unstable day-to-day that the whole idea of praying to Jesus didn't make any more sense to me than looking to God to stop my parents from fighting and drinking and scaring the hell out of me night after night. Jesus seemed to be a beautiful man and someone to look up to, yet beyond emulation I couldn't figure out my relationship to him. Should I be capitalizing the h in him or his when I speak of Jesus? Who was more powerful ... Jesus or God? If I focused more on Jesus, would God get angry? While these questions might seem sophomoric and childlike, they were actually the questions that would rumble around in the mind of this fully-grown adult male.

As an adult, I would take a religious hiatus from time to time, because church attendance didn't seem to create any positive difference in my life. The question of who Jesus was to me, however, would continue to haunt me. Whenever Easter would roll around, guilt would arise when the passion and crucifixion of Christ was read. It would always remind me of how unworthy I was, and how I could never stand up for anything in the way Jesus did.

In an effort to figure this relationship out, I attended church retreats and even took on various volunteer roles in church, thinking that if I was more self-forgetting like Jesus I would find the answer and be more like him. Well, long-story-short, after many years of frustration and failing to connect to this Jesus of the church, I decided I would give myself permission to explore other religions. A few of my friends had been attending a church called Unity, and often spoke of the warmth and welcoming community they were experiencing there. So after sampling a number of different traditional churches I attended my first service at Unity in 1992,. I will never forget the eerie feeling of entering a brownstone building - that was not a church - for my first Sunday service. I had never been in a church that was not a traditional church building. I entered feeling scared, disloyal to my old church, but curious and excited at the prospect of something new. Arthur Wells, the minister, welcomed me warmly at the door, and then I quickly scooted over to sit with some friends I recognized.

As I sat there, listening to the old radiator pipes rattling while the room heated up, I chatted a bit with my friend who sat next to me, and nervously looked around the room checking out the people who were entering and taking their place in the wooden folding chairs that served as seating. Shortly it was time for the service to begin, and after the opening hymn and announcements, Rev. Wells, began his talk. The topic of his talk escapes my memory, but within the first 5 minutes of his talk, he spoke of the Christ Presence - the Divine Potential within us all - and Jesus as the way-shower. He recited a gospel verse which I will probably be paraphrasing here, where Jesus told his disciples in response to their praise of his miracles that "you shall do even greater things." I was dumbfounded, shocked, and giddy at these simple revelations because I just knew these statements to be true. It had to be so. Everything else I'd learned about my relationship to this biblical Jesus made no sense to me, yet here I was connecting to a truth that resonated throughout my being as peace and amazement and best of all truth. I was so happy!

I guess the old adages, Knock and the door will open and Ask and ye shall find certainly proved true for me. My desire and my search had led me to the answers to my question, and as result gave me a powerful resource and a new self-image. I and everyone else had this Christ potential within us; therefore the possibilities for my life were unlimited. This Jesus that I have found is an inner source of strength, direction, and Divine wisdom whenever I choose to remember who I am beyond my ego. My gratitude overflows for Spirit leading me to Unity Church and for the words I heard Arthur Wells speak that day.
