Easter and Salvation

A "traditional" view of creation and salvation...

First God created a perfect world with perfect people but it didn't stay perfect for very long. Depending on whom you listen to, either God or God's adversary tempted God's people into disobeying Him and thereby bringing eternal trouble into His formerly perfect world. Later around the year 4 BC God sent his son Jesus (or perhaps Himself as Jesus) to serve as a human sacrifice to atone not only the errors of the first two people and those who came after them, but also for people who had not yet been born, but who would be born and would continue to commit errors even though he had atoned for them. We are then encouraged to accept this story as good news and hope that through it we might somehow achieve reconciliation with God and Jesus, but probably only after we die. To me all of this sounds very confusing and also like pretty poor planning on that part of God. Taken at face value it would appear that God is neither capable of creating an enduringly perfect world or of saving His creation from continuing troubles. Is this really God?

Another way of looking at creation...

First we must understand that our Bible's creation stories are allegories; stories created to symbolically address questions like: How did the world come to be? And, how did problems come into the world? Since the book of Genesis offers two completely different accounts of creation we can deduce that neither was being offered as a literal history. As we examine them carefully we will notice that God is presented as Spirit and so His creations must be the offspring of Spirit. We will also notice that God as Spirit is able to create physical substance out of the unformed, out of Itself. In the New Testament Jesus clearly states, "God is Spirit..." (John 4:24.) He goes on to teach that we are children of God and therefore spiritual and eternal in nature. He also teaches that we have the ability to create or un-create just like our Creator, "For truly I tell you, if you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to this

mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible for you." (Matthew 17:20) From this we begin to realize that it is God's laws of creation working through us that are building our world. The way our physical world shows up for us has its foundation

in the thoughts and beliefs that we, God's creations, place our faith in.

Now about all those troubles we experience...

In the Old Testament we see references to problems and difficulties caused by the "hardness of the hearts of men" (and women) and in the New Testament by a lack of compassion and disconnection from the Spirit of God and God's Love. To me this is the most basic explanation of how trouble came into our world and why it still troubles us today. We are creative by nature but often we create without much love or compassion and so we make things that feel painful and alien to us. This process begins with our thoughts and then becomes solidified into the very substance of our bodies and our world. Each time we think unlovingly or uncompassionately we create a little more difficulty and suffering. The second Genesis allegory uses Adam and Eve to symbolize all of humanity. When our minds turn toward thoughts of "good and evil", love and its opposites, we join Adam and Eve in confused thinking and we suffer along with them.

Jesus taught that our salvation or release from suffering lies not in sacrifices but in a consciousness of love and compassion; an opening of mind and heart that allows Creative Love and Life to move freely through us. Each time we recall that we are spirit and life and turn our minds toward goodness alone we move ourselves toward salvation and freedom. Jesus used not just his teachings but his very life to convey this message. He taught this one message consistently in all circumstances, even in the extreme circumstance of his own trial and execution. Through his

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most satisfying gift."

unswerving identification with and faith in his spiritual nature and the power of God he transcended death and tomb. As timeless spirit he still continues to teach and guide and inspire.

Now is our time for remembering...

Easter is an opportunity for us to remember that our lives will either be an expression of our true spiritual nature and a reflection of our Creator's Love, or they will be an expression of some form of loveless thought or superstition that we choose to put in its place. Since God is Spirit and we are spirit our salvation can never come through a body. It can't come through the glorification of a body or the sacrificing of a body. Salvation lies in our willingness to remember Spirit and to begin to look beyond physical appearances. We must find this in our relationships with our brothers and sisters as well as for ourselves. We do this in part by building faith or trust in God alone rather than in God and evil. We do this by choosing to align our thoughts with God's loving ideas rather than with lesser ideas like blame, anger and fear. And as we do our part the remainder of our salvation is accomplished by the Spirit of God, the higher loving intelligence that already exists within us and all those around us. This spirit of holiness illuminates us from within and releases us from the fearful images we have made. The best news of all is that since salvation is an inner shift made in Spirit it can happen for us in any circumstance and at any time.

May your mind be open to the Holiness within you, that you may find your innocence and your salvation, your timeless perfection and your oneness with God. Amen.

Unity Book Club April-June selection

"A Return to Love" by, Marianne Williamson

A Return to Love is Marianne Williamson's classic reflection on her early experiences with A Course In Miracles, a spiritual program for self-healing. In the book she discusses how we each can each become "miracle workers" by taking control of our minds and choosing to express love in all of our relationships. Whether our present problems seem to be in the area of relationships, career, or health, she shows how love is always the answer, our key to healing and wellbeing.

This book is based on Williamson's own discovery of A Course in Miracles when she was just 26. Being Jewish she initially had little hope for finding inspiration from the book because of its use of traditional Christian terminology. Years later she is now one of the leading spokespersons on the Course, a book that has worked "miracles" for her and for countless others. A Return to Love is easy to read and a nice introduction for those who are interested in learning more about the teachings of A Course In Miracles.

Spotlight on Service

For those of us called to service there is often a calling which comes from within the" heart space" as Jane puts it.: that "still small voice" or the heart-pull that says "there is a real need here and I can help." Her joy in working with Unity's

children is very apparent and in that service she has experienced spiritual growth and expansion as a person. Jane has blessed us all with her work, as she focuses on using her gifts to make a difference in the world.

Two years ago, looking for a quieter and simpler life, I moved to Arlington, Vermont. Having been formerly involved at Unity Church in Amesbury, Massachusetts and owning a passion for the teachings of Charles and Myrtle Fillmore I eventually made my way here to Unity of Albany.

"Then you will know the truth and the truth will set you free" Jn8:32.

Through the six decades of my life, I have been influenced by many diverse cultural mores: June Cleaver, Malcom X, the Beatles, Gandhi, Watergate... It is little wonder that I am not schizophrenic; I know I have been disillusioned. Coming to Unity, however, has been coming home. I have come home to my inner child, my truth. Through the work that I have been doing, I recognize and understand more and more who I am and what I am about. God is my Source; God will provide me with all manner of good; I am a child of God. I am free. These are troubled times, but it is through this recognition that I can face each day with a smile on my face and joy in my heart, and I can put aside the "small stuff "around me.

My mother has been my greatest influence and model for service. Following her example, I have always been involved in some type of service since my Brownie days in first grade. It brings me joy to see that what I can do to use my own special gifts and talents to bring a light to the eye of someone else, or make their day just a little better.

The second time I attended a Unity service in Amesbury, MA back in 2005, the Service Coordinator announced from the platform that there was a need for a hospitality leader. "Well", I thought, "How hard is it to make a pot of coffee?", so I met her afterwards and began a long journey of participation in the many service teams. I did hospitality for 2 ½ years which was a great way to meet people and get to know the church culture. From there I moved into other Ministry teams: Chaplains, Ushers and Greeters,



Sunday Service Coordinator, PowerPoint and Sound, Teacher in Youth and Family. I basically showed up where the need was.

Being in service is a calling that I feel deep in my heart space. Where and when I serve is motivated by that intuitive "small voice" that nudges me to move in one direction or another. I do what I feel called to do at the time. Sometimes I move onto a service team because there is a need, but mostly because Spirit is calling me to use my gifts here or there. Every opportunity has brought me great joy.

My love in service has been the children. The world and its economies, politics, and environmental issues are very difficult to deal with and everything is changing so rapidly that it is difficult to know which way to go! But there is also hope on the horizon. When I look into the faces of the kids on Sunday morning, I KNOW there is hope. I have the honor and privilege to bear witness to the future of our world every week. I have watched their passion as they discuss ideas on how to right the wrongs of our environment; I see their fortitude and compassion as they talk about ways to avoid bullying in their world and to make peace with all manner of diversity. I'm amazed at the questioning voices that ask "How come it isn't better?" Not only the youth of our little community, but all the youth of Unity are a passionate, caring, bright, group of young people who will soon lead this country and this world into the future. I have seen them at rallies and retreats, I have heard their voices and I know that we are surely in good hands. Witnessing this and hopefully being one small part of it is why I do what I do.

I realize that I have a very narrow comfort zone at times and a strong sense of discomfort when I attempt to move out of it. At the same time I sense there is something important on the other side of that line that has something to do with my growth and expansion. That is the challenge and the reward of giving of myself in service.

What I would say to anyone thinking of getting involved in service, I cannot say any better than Kahlil Gibran who said, "I slept and I dreamed that life is all joy. I woke and I saw that life is all service. I served and I saw that service is joy." It has certainly been a joy for me.

The Music Box How Sweet the Sound

We have been offering our music and meditation service on a weekly basis each Sunday evening since this past September. Early in the week I take some time to plan the service, listening for a theme to present itself. One that has come up a few times now is that of *Healing and Wholeness*. That makes perfect sense in that it's why we gather to begin with. Healing is always an underlying theme. The practice of chanting sacred song is in itself a healing practice and the intent is to allow the song to take us deeply enough to touch that place of wholeness within and bring it back with us to the 'surface', if you will.

Recently we have been singing Sufi healing chant that prays, "Let me do Thy will, Allah", and then calls upon God as the Healer whose grace is sufficient to meet all our needs. You could say that being out of alignment with the will of God is ultimately the cause of our experience of a lack of wholeness; of the human condition. Here's a quote from A Course in Miracles that brings this to light:

"You are afraid to know God's Will because you believe it is not yours. This belief is your whole sickness and your whole fear. Every symptom of sickness and fear arises here, because this is the belief that makes you want not to know." ACIM, Text Chapter 11.I.10

Odd as it seems, we are actually afraid of God's will. And the point of a spiritual practice is to help us drop that fear and melt a little more into the arms of God; to come home step by step. We need each other to do that, too, and that's what a church is for, or a prayer circle is for, isn't it?. Actually, that is what all of our relationships ultimately are for.

Recently someone, having attended the evening service for the first time, remarked that it felt very sweet to her. I knew just what she meant. Chanting together and allowing the song to lead us to that place of wholeness often engenders a palpable aura of bliss. At the end of a chant you can frequently feel it settle over the room.

Back in the fall, around the time of *Rosh Hashana*, we sang this Hebrew chant: "Hineh ma tov umah nayim, shevet achim gam yachad." It quotes the beginning of Psalm 133, a passage which speaks precisely and eloquently about this very sweetness.

"Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brothers and sisters to dwell together in unity! It is like the precious oil upon the head, coming down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard, coming down upon the edge of his robes. It is like the dew of Hermon coming down upon the mountains of Zion." - Psalm 133

How sweet the sound of our home-coming. How sweet the sound of remembering our wholeness.
