As I write this article, I look out on grey skies and rain trying to decide if it will turn to snow.

Yes, the weather is doing its transformation dance between winter and spring. It is making the decision to come out of slumber...to release old life and allow new life to rise. What does spring, butterflies and Jesus all have in common? The ability to transmute out of death to rise greatly as new life.

We who live in a climate where there are four seasons, have a greater understanding of this. As the cold weather comes in and snow blankets the ground, the trees and plants go dormant. Most plants die in front of our eyes. Yet, beneath the surface, beyond our eyesight, change is taking place. Deep in the soil, new life comes about. Trees and plants are gorging on the nutrients of the soil then they fight their way up through the heavy soil to become something grander than what they were. It rises out of the darkness into the light as new life.

The caterpillar is a beautiful example of something that fully comes apart to rise anew. The hungry caterpillar gorges itself with leaves, growing plumper and larger. One day, the caterpillar stops eating, hangs upside down from a twig or leaf, and molts into a shiny chrysalis. It is here the caterpillar radically transforms its body. It digests itself, releasing enzymes to dissolve all of its tissues, making a caterpillar soup. Eventually it emerges as a butterfly. It stands for hours gently moving its wings, pumping fluids into them to extend them fully. Then the butterfly soars gracefully away leaving nothing behind but a broken chrysalis to indicate its former bondage.

Jesus was sort of a human caterpillar. Jesus gorged on spiritual Truth. He continued to have a deeper and more expansive understanding of who he was. He was the son of God and allowed God to do its works through him (John 14:10). One can think of Jesus on the cross and his crucifixion, like the caterpillar attaching itself on a twig, as he is consciously deciding to free himself of his True self. The chrysalis and butterfly suggest the empty graveclothes of Jesus who has risen. He has burst forth into new life from the tomb. The bondage of death is broken. Christ is risen!

When you see a beautiful butterfly, or when you see the dead shell of a chrysalis on the ground, you do not grieve for the dead caterpillar. No, both of these experiences indicate the continuity of life itself. This account of Jesus is in fact alive to help us, to guide us, to give us hope for our own future. Like winter forming into spring, a caterpillar metamorphosing into a butterfly, the man Jesus transmuting into what he was born to be—Christ; we too are here to do the same. Ella Wheeler Wilcox said, "Go roll the stone of self away and let the Christ within thee arise." When the beautiful, new self arises in you, you do not mourn over the old self. The old self becomes new when you take on and gorge the fruits of spiritual teachings, practice the teachings, and live the teachings by allow God to do its works in and through you.

Rowing to the Other Shore



Lorre Wyatt wrote this little bi-lingual song called *Somos El-Barco* some years ago. Here's the first verse and chorus:

The stream sings it to the river, The river sings it to the sea, The sea sings it to the boat That carries you and me.

Somos el barco, somos el mar, Yo navego en ti, tu navegas en mi. We are the boat, we are the sea, I sail in you, you sail in me.

I've been singing it for years and I realize now that it's actually a very Buddhist song. The raft is one of the principle archetypes of Buddhism. "We're all swimming to the other side," to quote another folk song, although in Mahayana (or big raft) Buddhism, it's more like we're rowing together. The Japanese have a

name for the "other side" - Higan. It's a translation of the Sanskrit word *paramita* and literally means to cross over to the other shore. We are on this shore and the Buddhists are very frank about its nature. It's the place of ignorance and suffering. The Buddhas (there have been more than one) made it across to the "pure land" of enlightenment or Nirvana.

How to get there? You take three vows. You take refuge in the *Buddha* who showed the way across. You take refuge in the *dharma* - the raft itself; the teachings of the Buddha. And you take refuge in the *sangha* - all of us who are on this ship together and are committed to the journey. I sail in you; you sail in me. It's a simple and beautiful creed, is it not?

I bring all this up because we've just arrived at the Spring Equinox. In Japanese Buddhism it is the feast of *Higan*, which is also celebrated at the Autumnal Equinox. It's a time of balance. Day and night are of equal length. Temperatures are temperate. For those who observe Higan it is a significant moment. Through their practice they strive to live a life that is in balance. They focus on the six paramitas: giving, right behavior, endurance/patience, endeavor/effort, meditation, and wisdom.

Christianity has also chosen the Vernal Equinox to celebrate its holiest feast of Easter, itself a passage from suffering to transformation. It in turn is of course rooted in the Jewish tradition of Passover and the deliverance of a people from

oppression to safety.



handed down—*dharma*—of the great ones who have shown the way.

We ourselves live in a world very much out of balance. It's up to each of us to find the balance in our own lives; to practice ways of right living, patience, effort, prayer and wisdom. Then we begin to build small communities of balance and we learn the art of rowing together. We catch the river's song and we find the current.

We're doing it already, and it gives me great hope to be sharing this raft with you.

Audio/Visual Equipment

ver the months, we've had numerous people provide input about our sound abilities. With the equipment we previously had, it was

difficult to address sound issues. I am really pleased to share with you that in December 2016 we were blessed with some new sound and video equipment. This new equipment allows us to provide an even

better listening experience for you at our normal Sunday morning services as well as during our music ministry on Sunday evenings. We've also re-positioned the speakers to give you a more uniform listening experience.

As we continue to grow,

we've occasionally been blessed with more people than our sanctuary can hold. This often occurs for our special services like Christmas Eve, New Year's Eve and Easter services. With our new equipment we are now able to live stream to the large flat screen TV in the Fellowship Hall. Now more people can enjoy the services without being cramped and possibly creating safety issues in the sanctuary. We can also live stream to You Tube for folks who can't attend these services. The new equipment will give us lots of flexibility as we continue to grow our congregation.

We have had some growing pains with this new equipment. We appreciate everyone's patience as we learn and adjust to the new system. As always, we are grateful for any feedback concerning the A/V system. Please let us know if it is too loud or too soft. We will try to adjust accordingly. Feedback has been provided concerning the view from the camera used for streaming the services and we are looking to correct that. Note that, at the time of composing this article, we have made arrangements to meet with the sound system supplier and one of the top issues to be resolved is getting the wireless hearing assistance devices working properly.

And concerning safety, we ask that you refrain from walking behind the back pew

on the side with the sound. It's very crowded with all the great equipment and we would appreciate it if you could use other aisles to move about the sanctuary.

The audio/visual team is always open to adding new members. A familiarity with PowerPoint and sound systems is helpful, but not a require-

ment. Contact Terry if you are interested.
